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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2019

Over the year to 30th June 2019 the Edinburgh College Development Trust has had a number of firsts as part of its evolution. It held its first reunion and hosted its first fundraising dinner. This has been reflected in nearly a 50% increase in income over the previous year and a slight increase in expenditure. Overall the Trust estimates it has helped over 900 students of Edinburgh College.

The fundraising dinner launched the Development Trusts' biggest fundraising activity to provide activities for students with additional support needs outwith the College timetable. The Trust is very grateful to Mr Peter de Vink for his huge efforts developing the project and leading the fundraising.

I would like to thank the Trust staff and Trustees for all their efforts over the year as well as Edinburgh College and Edinburgh College Students' Association for their support in delivering benefits to the students. The feedback from the recipients of our activities drives us to do more.

TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2019

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2019, which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes. The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Objectives

The charitable objectives of the Edinburgh College Development Trust (hereafter referred to as the Development Trust) are:

- The advancement of education generally
- The support of learners at Edinburgh College, including the provision of physical buildings and facilities and the improvement of the learning environment of the Edinburgh College campuses.

These objectives are to be achieved through a mission to bring together people, organisations and resources to generate income, give advice and deliver projects to enhance the contribution Edinburgh College makes to the communities it serves.

The Development Trust aims:

- To make the biggest difference by working together in partnership with others such as Edinburgh College and Edinburgh College Students' Association, to best support the student community.
- To focus on giving opportunities to students in the areas of employability, development of life skills, widening horizons, promoting positive mental wellbeing, overcoming poverty of ambition, and campus improvements particularly where the latter supports the previous aims.
- To be the best grant maker that we can be to support students. Supporting learners at Edinburgh College is at the heart of what we do and grant making is a key part of this.

Achievements

The charitable company has brought in funds to support projects of nearly £111k (2018: £77k), this includes £71k (2018: £44k) of grants and donations and circa £34k (2018: £33k) of in-kind contributions.

In this financial year the Development Trust has supported in the region of 914 students (2018: 376 students) in various ways, giving out nearly £33k (2018: £13k) directly in grants and scholarships.

Three grant steams were offered by the Development Trust during 2018/19:

- Student Group Grants: These are applied for on behalf of a group of students by a member of staff.
 Seven were offered in 2018/19 ranging from professional cookery students entering the Scot Hot
 competition, to active tourism students organising a three-day canoe down the River Spey, to
 marketing communications students designing and building a website for the North Edinburgh
 community. Around 301 students were supported by this grant stream and £9k was distributed,
 less a £5k grant withdrawn from the previous year.
- Hard Times Fund: This fund, supporting students in specific types of immediate financial need, was launched in autumn 2018 with funds from five different sources. It supported 23 students and distributed £11k helping students who might otherwise potentially have dropped out of college due to short term financial constraints.

- Student scholarships: Three scholarships were awarded benefiting not only the successful student but also those who gained experience of making an application and taking part in a panel interview.
 - Alex F Noble Electric Vehicle scholarship
 - John Byrne Award Ambassador scholarship
 - David Doig Foundation STEM scholarship

The charitable company works closely with partner organisations such as Edinburgh College and the Edinburgh College Students' Association (ECSA) which is set up as an independent charity. In the current year the Development Trust continued to support, with its staff time (for which the Trust receives a contribution towards staff salaries), the Go Green low carbon travel project that the Trust raised the funds for in the previous financial year. This project, which is funded from Scottish Government's Climate Challenge Fund run by Keep Scotland Beautiful, runs until the end of March 2020 and has this year benefitted 393 students and gives four students a year with paid work experience. As well as providing employability opportunities it also provides volunteering opportunities as well as broadening student horizons and helping them to develop life skills.

Several campus improvements were installed this year:

- A wheelchair accessible picnic table for the Milton Road campus with funds donated by Forth Ports Ltd in relation to the Leith Nautical College reunion
- A wireless digital transmitter system for the instrumentation and control students within the Oil and Gas courses at Midlothian campus donated by the David Doig Foundation
- New outdoor equipment for the students with additional support needs
- Support was received from two sources specifically for art and design, and graphic design

The Development Trust ran the charity's first alumni reunion in September 2018 to mark the 40th anniversary of the new site at Milton Road for Leith Nautical College (one of the predecessor colleges to Edinburgh College). Sixty-three people attended the dinner, reconnecting with the College, and several hundred came to the day-time exhibition that was part of Edinburgh Doors Open Day. Funds were raised through ticket sales, donations and sponsorship.

The Trust's first fundraising dinner was run in March to raise funds for the Wider Horizons project – a Saturday and summer club for students with additional support needs running for three years. Around £17k in restricted funds was raised from the dinner.

Fundraising

In order to support students the Development Trust needs to raise funds. This has primarily been done through grant applications to external trusts and foundations and donations from individuals and businesses. However some money has also come in via sponsorship, and there have been several in-kind donations. In addition to this the Development Trust assists in attracting funding to Edinburgh College and to ECSA for projects which are managed directly by them for the benefit of students.

Governance and staffing

During the year the Development Trust has had one full time member of staff in post. This individual is employed by Edinburgh College and the costs are recharged to the Development Trust. One intern, who was paid for by the Robertson Trust from May-September 2018, supported the Trust Manager to deliver various projects and subsequently volunteered for the rest of the year.

In terms of governance one trustee has resigned because of a change in his career. One new trustee has been recruited to replace him, and one trustee vacancy remains outstanding to be filled in early 2019/20. The trustees have given an estimated 41 days of volunteer time across the year.

Promoting the Development Trust

Across the year a number of new marketing initiatives were undertaken, at little or no cost to the charitable company:

- Significant PR has been gained by the College's Communications Department for the Development Trust throughout the year to build awareness across the College with staff and students, and externally through newspaper articles, and motions in parliament.
- A new Student of the Year award was given at both the College's Graduation ceremony (for higher education students) and Prize Giving ceremony (for further education students) each for a student who had gone "above and beyond" to support fellow students.

In summary, the Edinburgh College Development Trust is making excellent progress in supporting students at Edinburgh College, in raising funds to do so and to sustain the charitable company, and in putting the charitable company in a best practice position in regard to governance.

Financial Review

During the year the charitable company received income of £110,962 (2018: £77,290) and incurred expenditure of £126,580 (2018: £117,611). Net expenditure for the year was therefore £15,618 (2018: £40,321) reflecting net expenditure on unrestricted funds of £35,596 (2018: net expenditure £47,205) and net income of £19,978 (2018: £6,884) in restricted funds.

Investment policy

The Trustees, having regard to the liquidity requirements of running the charity, have kept available funds in an interest-bearing account and seek to maximise interest where practicable.

Reserves Policy

At 30 June 2019, the charitable company has total funds of £96,123 (2018: £111,741), made up of £41,857 (2018: £77,453) of unrestricted funds and £54,266 (2018: £34,288) of restricted funds. As the charitable company has no fixed assets, the unrestricted funds of £41,857 (2018: £77,453) reflect the 'free reserves' of the charitable company.

Edinburgh College has offered an unrestricted donation to the Development Trust of up to £50,000 in 2019/20 to enable the Trust to meet its ongoing operational costs and to establish its future business model. On this basis, the trustees continue to consider the appropriate level of reserves to retain for operational and working capital purposes and the level of funding that can be released in the current and future periods for charitable purposes. The trustees are conscious of the sensitivities to future income streams at this early stage of development of the charitable company and have therefore set the reserves

policy as one year's running costs. Based on expenditure levels in the current year, this would be approximately £68,000 (2018: £60,000).

Plans for Future Periods

In 2019/20 the Development Trust aims to build on this, to consolidate the existing grants, to focus on bringing the charity to a financially sustainable position in regard to core costs and to work closely with Edinburgh College and with ECSA to identify and raise funds for projects.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The organisation became an incorporated charitable company limited by guarantee on 6 February 2014. It was established by a Memorandum and Articles of Association that lays out the objects and powers of the company and the means by which it is governed.

Responsibilities of the Directors

The trustees, who are directors for the purpose of company law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 6.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The trustees of the company comprise a Chairman together with a minimum of five, and a maximum of nine, Board Members. Each trustee is elected for a term of three years at the Annual General Meeting of the company and may stand for re-election once thereafter. Up to two of the Board Members may also be a member of the Board of Management of Edinburgh College.

In addition the trustees may appoint additional trustees up to the maximum specified above to replace any trustee who resigns or dies mid-term or to fill a vacancy not filled at the Annual General Meeting. Any such trustee appointed must first be approved by the trustees as having the appropriate capabilities to perform the duties of trustee in the best interests of the company; and any meeting to consider appointment must have in attendance one of the trustees, if any, who are also members of the Board of Management of Edinburgh College.

Organisational Structure

The Development Trust's Trust Manager runs and operates the charitable company on a day to day basis with the Board of Trustees directing and controlling the overall operations.

Risk Management

The trustees have considered the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed and now maintain a risk register which is reviewed on a regular basis. The main risk identified is a potential failure to raise sufficient funding in support of the Trust's strategic priorities.

The charitable company's trustees (who are also directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2019

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015) in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in UK (FRS 102) issued in January 2015 (as updated), and applicable accounting standards.

Edinburgh College Development Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the charitable company will continue in operation for at least a period of twelve months from the date of approving the financial statements. The trustees consider there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

Income

Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charitable company has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Income received by way of grants or donations is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance of the charitable company, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charitable company where this can be quantified.
- Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charitable company; this is normally upon notification of the interest received by the Bank.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. The charitable company is not registered for VAT, therefore expenditure includes irrecoverable VAT. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

Expenditure on charitable activities comprises those costs incurred by the charitable company in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs form part of charitable support costs and comprise those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charitable company, including the independent examination fee and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity. Support costs are the administrative costs of running the charity.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2019

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Taxation

As a charitable company the organisation is exempt from tax on income and gains to the extent that these are applied to its charitable activities. No tax charge has arisen in the year.

Debtors

Other debtors and prepayments are recognised at the settlement amount due and prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charitable company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments

The charitable company has only financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charitable company comprise both unrestricted and restricted funds. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for a particular restricted purpose.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

2 Liability of members

The liability of each member is limited to £1, being the amount that each member undertakes to contribute to the assts of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while he is a member or within one year after he ceases to be a member.

12 Related party transactions

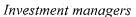
